# Dr Mark Prince OBE inspirational Year 11 talk

This term Year 11 had the honour of meeting Dr Mark Prince OBE. Prince is the CEO and Founder of the Kiyan Prince Foundation, a charity created following the tragic murder of his fifteen year old son, Kiyan, in 2006. Kiyan was stabbed in the heart, whilst trying to break up a fight outside his school gates.

Prince shared his personal challenges before fatherhood (physical abuse as a child, homelessness, drugs and alcohol abuse and criminal activity) and his transformation in becoming a professional boxer, achieving titles such as the IBF and WBO Inter-continental Light heavyweight Championship by 1997 and fighting for a world title in 1998.

The tragedy of losing his son unleashed a burning desire to support young people embroiled in the downward spiral of urban violence. Prince's story of loss, strength, resilience and forgiveness was an inspiration to all.







## Future Champions - with Mark Prince

Following the inspirational talk from Mark Prince to the whole of Year 11 in September, a small group of boys were selected to take part in a 12 week 'Future Champions Programme'.

Taking place on a Wednesday morning, the two hour sessions consisted of an hour of discussion, self-reflection and target setting, followed by an hour of fitness training which includes shadow boxing and bag work.

Attendance at the sessions has been excellent and all the students involved have made significant progress in their commitment and effort.

Quotes from the students involved include.

"It is the highlight of my school week. Mark is amazing, such a hero for what he has been through."

"I've really learnt to look at my future and think about what I really want to achieve in life" And, "I'm really getting into the boxing sessions, I've never really enjoyed sport, but I am thinking about taking this up outside of school".

All the boys want to say a huge thank you and are looking forward to the final few sessions in January.

# PSHE/RSE talk on Domestic Violence and Toxic Relationships by Andrew Bernard

As part of our drive to create well-rounded individuals that are able to respect others and know how to form healthy, meaningful relationships, we welcomed Andrew Bernard into the school to speak.

Bernard's talk is designed to help people recognise domestic abuse, appreciate the damaging nature of its portrayal in the media and 'entertainment', know what to do if they (or someone they know) experiences it, and finally challenge our young men to stop the cycle of violence in their generation.

Bernard shared the story of his sister, Sarah Gosling - murdered by her partner, Ian Hope in 2012. He talked through the ways in which domestic abuse can start

and escalate within relationships. The talk raised awareness of domestic violence and toxic behaviours in relationships, challenging some of the myths around the subject and the responsibilities that everyone holds to bring about meaningful change in society.

### Transition Mentors

To add to our extensive transition programme for new Year 7 students, this year we recruited the help of 24 boys from Year 8 who had demonstrated our values of Excellence, Character and Respect throughout their own Year 7.

Carefully selected by their form tutors and head of year Ms McInally, the boys received a lapel badge so they could be easily identified by the younger students. They have undertaken a number of tasks in the first term which include, supporting on transition days and induction days, visiting form groups on a regular basis, and their weekly duty, positioned in the Year 7 playground looking out for those boys who may need an extra 'push' to make some new friends.

They have all been fabulous and have been excellent ambassadors for the school. Mr Jameson, their head of year, who has been coordinating the programme this year has also been super impressed and this is definitely a programme we will be repeating again.




#### Staff Stars

# GB News interview with Year 10 about PSHE/RSE lessons with Survivors UK



In October we were approached by news presenter, Ellie Costello from GB News regarding the PSHE/RSE lessons at Verulam that had been co-delivered by the charity Survivors UK.

This term, Year 10 focused on Relationships, examining what makes a relationship healthy/ unhealthy, control, abuse and discussing consent. To support the delivery of these topics we engaged with Survivors UK who delivered a series of workshops.

Sam Thompson, an outreach worker from the charity focused on the issue of sexual violence towards men and the stigma that exists in society, affecting men reporting attacks and speaking out to access help. Boys were shocked to learn that 1 in 6 men are the

victims of sexual violence, as opposed to 1 in 3 women. In addition, boys were told of the shocking statistic that the average male victim takes 26 years to disclose an attack to anyone.

They discussed the impact that carrying such trauma must have on male mental health and the importance of normalising the conversation about men being victims so that they are supported to speak out to access support if needed.

Ellie Costello interviewed two of our Year 10 boys about the impact of the workshops and their views on the importance of learning about such subject matter.



# A revamp to the Library





During the COVID bubble year, our Library was out of action. To celebrate its re-opening, a fresh style was introduced ready to welcome pupils. Alongside introducing over 50 new titles and a brand-new layout by genre, new displays were created to provide pupils with a reading environment.

In October, our main theme was Black History Month, championing new titles such as Olusoga's Black and British, Akala's Natives, Zoboi and Salaam's Punching in the Air and Abike-lyimide's Ace of Spades to name a few. Our Black Panther cut out represented Marvel's historical inspiration of the women warriors of Dahomey. The end of October witnessed our own Halloween display with

books that looked like a pumpkin! In November, we commemorated Remembrance by championing numerous titles, from classics such as War Horse and All Quiet on the Western Front, to new titles such as Five Children on the Western Front and Now or Never: A Dunkirk Story.

We also had a remembrance table dedicated to two ex-students that fought and died in World War Two, with their names on display next to a poppy wreath.

#### Reuben Arthur visits for BHM 2021

From the 11th to the 15th October, Reuben Arthur visited Verulam School and spoke to students about Black History as part of BHM 2021.

Reuben Arthur (born 12 October 1996) is a British male track and field sprinter who specialises in the 100 metres. He was a relay gold medallist with England at the 2018 Commonwealth Games, leading off the team of Zharnel Hughes, Richard Kilty, and Harry Aikines-Aryeetey.

Born in Islington, London, he represented Great Britain in

age category competitions, including the World Youth Championships in Athletics, World Junior Championships in Athletics, European Athletics Junior Championships and European Athletics U23 Championships. He won his first international medal at the 2017 European Athletics U23 Championships, taking a silver with the 4 × 100 metres relay team including Theo Etienne, Kyle de Escofet and Ojie Edoburun.

He joined Enfield and Haringey Athletic Club and worked with coaches Edwin Stevens and Jonas Dodoo. He went on to study at Goldsmiths, University of London and won the British Universities 100 metres title in 2017.

Arthur spoke passionately about his journey in athletics and the importance of acknowledging that Black History is taking place every day.

Students and staff were excited to meet him and were treated to the opportunity to wear his gold medal!





# Flight School

The first few weeks have been spent watching the classic film, 633 Squadron before moving onto Airfix model making.


The students have been working together to share resources and ideas on what to build and how.



Over the course of the Autumn term, we ran Verulam School's first ever Smile-ing Boys' Project - the creation of internationally acclaimed artist, Kay Rufai, in order to promote positive mental well-being for BAME (Black and Minority Ethnicity) boys in the United Kingdom. https://www.theguardian.com/world/gallery/2020/mar/18/portraits-black-teenagers-south-londonmental-health

The purpose of the project is to encourage engagement and reflection of one's identity as a young black male growing up in London, allowing the boys the opportunity to explore issues around stereotypes, pressures, a sense of belonging, representation in the media etc. so that they are able to feel a sense of self-worth and pride, making positive choices as they come of age.

Over the course of the project, the boys participate in weekly workshops, ending with each pupil having their portrait taken, to celebrate their identity and heritage, whilst simultaneously promoting images of black boys smiling – a contrast to the common negative depictions of this group

perpetuated by the media. After the portraits are taken, the boys enjoy a group lunch, celebrating and bonding with one another. This project has been hugely successful for us at Verulam School, improving our boys' sense of self-worth, enabling them to recognise the importance of embracing one's culture and uniqueness, and in allowing them a safe space to explore issues around race and identity.

In order to showcase this wonderful project, St Albans Museum held an exhibition of the portraits, following a grand opening night that was attended by the boys, their parents, staff and a number of other community leaders and VIPs such as Stuart Lawrence, Dr Mark Prince OBE, the honourable Sheriff of Hertfordshire, Lionel Wallace, Action Jackson and CEO of KickOff@3, Michael Wallace.

## The Road to Independence Guest Lecture Series 2021-2022

To develop a stronger 'academic culture' in my Indian Independence A Level History course, coupled with advice from the history educator community about getting historians into A Level courses, I created an enrichment guest lecture programme made up of a range of speakers. These speakers include professors, lecturers and an MBE who will visit Verulam to deliver talks and offer a Q&A afterwards.

In November, we welcomed Dr Mark Condos in person, a lecturer and historian at Kings College London, interested in the intersections between violence, race, and law within the British and French Empires, with a particular focus on India and Algeria. In 2013, he received his PhD from the University of Cambridge. His research has examined the relationship between militarism, violence, and state-building in colonial Punjab and along the North-West Frontier of British India. Dr Condos delivered a thought-provoking lecture on India's contribution and involvement in World War One. This lecture not only gave our History A Level students an excellent insight into the topic, but also acted as an act

of remembrance, given it was in November.

In December, we welcomed Dr John McAleer remotely, an Associate Professor in History at the University of Southampton. He is a historian of the British Empire, with his work focusing on the British encounter and engagement with the wider world in the 18th and 19th centuries, situating the history of empire in its global and maritime contexts. Before joining Southampton, John was Curator of Imperial and Maritime History at the Greenwich National Maritime Museum. Dr McAleer again delivered an interesting lecture centred on tracing the rise and fall of the British Raj through six key buildings, using architecture as a motif to study the topic.

On both occasions, our A Level History students asked pertinent and thought-provoking questions, a real asset to the school.

# His Excellency the High Commissioner of St Kitts visits to see Verulam Smile-ing Boys

On Monday 22nd November,
His Excellency Dr Kevin M. Isaac,
the High Commissioner of St
Kitts was accompanied by
the honourable Sheriff of
Hertfordshire, Lionel Wallace
on a visit to Verulam School
to see a preview of the
Smile-ing Boys Project.

Dr Kevin M. Isaac assumed his responsibilities as St. Kitts and Nevis' High Commissioner to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland on January 12, 2011.

High Commissioner Isaac is also St. Kitts and Nevis
Permanent Representative to the International Maritime Organization (IMO); its non-resident Ambassador
Plenipotentiary and Extraordinary to the Socialist Republic of Vietnam and Governor to the Board of the Commonwealth Secretariat. He currently serves as Vice-Chair of the Board Governors of the Commonwealth Secretariat.

Previously, Mr. Isaac served as Advisor in the cabinet of the Assistant Secretary General of the Organization of American States (OAS) in Washington DC and as Coordinator of that Organization's 28 Country Offices throughout Latin America and the Caribbean.

Mr Isaac joined his country's Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1992 and has been a substantial resource to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs having served broadly as a Foreign Service officer. Following a period of service in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, he served as Deputy Permanent Representative and Charge d'Affaires ad interim at the St. Kitts and Nevis Permanent Mission to the United Nations in New York. He later served as Minister Counsellor/Deputy Chief of Mission and Charge d'Affaires at the St. Kitts and Nevis Embassy to the United States of America and as Minister Counsellor/Alternate Representative and Interim Representative in the St. Kitts and Nevis Permanent Mission to the Organization of American States, also in Washington DC. Kevin Isaac is a career diplomat and a graduate of the University

In 2012, he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate by the University of Birmingham, (UK). At the time of his appointment as High Commissioner in 2011, Kevin Isaac was the youngest and first career diplomat of the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis to be elevated to the rank of High Commissioner/Ambassador. He was named Diplomat of the Year for North America and the Caribbean in April 2015 at the Diplomat Magazine Annual Award presentation held in London.






