Work Shadowing Day

Throughout their time at Verulam, students are involved in a variety of career-related opportunities. These help them to make decisions and manage transitions as they progress through the Key Stages and onto post-GCSE options. Currently the majority select A-Level courses at Verulam followed by a University course.

Apprenticeships are also becoming an increasingly popular option. To bring post-school education and the world of work into focus, all Year 8 students took part in a Work Shadowing Day on Friday 20th January 2023. The Year 8 Work Shadowing Day involved students spending a day at a known workplace. This is usually with a parent/carer, a close family member or a close family friend. The aims of the day included: to help students to understand the role of different employees in an organisation, shadow the routines involved, reflect on their strengths in relation to work, communicate confidently with their peers and adults and relate future job

opportunities to their personal qualifications and skills. During the day students took time to observe, shadow and speak with both employers and employees.

A few students, for a variety of reasons, were unable to access a suitable venue for their shadowing so the school provided a full day of online and live activities. This included interactive interviews with a Civil Engineer, an academy Deputy Leader and a Site Manager.

At the close of the day all students completed an online feedback form in which students rated their day out of 10 for how enjoyable it was and whether it was a good use of a school day. The average scores from the whole year were 8.3 and 9.1 respectively. We are obviously delighted with this confirmation and look forward to running our 3rd annual Year 8 Work Shadowing day next January.

Curriculum Enrichment Day II

The second of three
Curriculum Enrichment Days
this academic year took place
on Thursday 19th January,
2023. Its theme was Religious
Education. Students across
all year groups and key stages
took part in a range of
activities, workshops and tasks
with links to different faiths,
representing a range of beliefs
from today's contemporary
British society.

Year 7 spent the day working with STEP (The St Albans and Harpenden Christian Education Project). It is a statutory requirement of the Hertfordshire Agreed Syllabus for RE that through Key Stage 3, schools should undertake an in-depth study of Christianity. Verulam School is proud and lucky to have a strong working relationship with STEP to deliver a strong Christian education to our students. There have even been some follow up visits in classroom sessions to discuss and debate the existence of God.

Many Year 8 students visited The British Museum to partake in a religious artefacts treasure hunt, seeking treasures from all six major world religions – just like Indiana Jones! Students had the opportunity to explore and experience cultures across the globe from the dawn of human history to the present day. There were also many cross-curricular links to enrich other subject areas, including Art, Geography, History, D&T and Citizenship.

Other Year 8 students remained on site and completed some beautiful pieces of spirited arts, considering the relationship between religion and art. Students used different artistic styles, including Chinese paper lanterns, Buddhist mandalas, Islamic pattern stencils and stained-glass designs.

Verulam is a UCL Beacon School centre for Holocaust Education. Year 9 students received important Holocaust Education on this day in the lead up to Holocaust Memorial Day on Friday 27th January 2023. A challenging but necessary day of staff-led workshops covered the topics Being Human, what was the Holocaust?, Authentic Encounters and Resistance. They also watched a documentary with Holocaust survivor Freddie Knollers. This was further supported by an assembly the following week.

Year 10 were visited by a number of guests speakers for a multifaith panel. Guests from Humanists UK, Mitzvah Day (Judaism), Hinduism, Islam and Buddhism. It was a great opportunity for students to engage with different members from local faith communities. There will be some further works with Mitzvah

Day in the Summer Term. Two external companies presented to Year 11 students in support of their GCSE Religious Studies content and revision. Mitzvah Day spoke about Judaism and the Jewish beliefs concerning social action and justice. Stand Up! Education against Discrimination is an interfaith programme led by facilitators from Jewish and Muslim backgrounds, demonstrating how groups often perceived as oppositional can work together successfully.

Through debunking myths and challenging stereotypes about the communities, young people's critical thinking skills are developed, enabling them to identify and counter discrimination safely and responsibly. Students also had the opportunity to develop their revision skills with a focus on their current GCSE philosophical unit of work about the existence of God and revelation.

A spiritually enriching day was had by all. Year 13 even managed to demonstrate mindfulness by practising yoga.

Year 11 Edexcel Awards in Mathematics


In January all of our year 11 students sat an Edexcel Award in Mathematics.

Gothic Tales

On Monday 16th January, Year 9 had the opportunity to take part in an in-school event, 'Gothic Tales'.

The workshop (run by Red Heart Theatre) incorporated the telling of 3 gothic tales from the golden age of gothic horror: The Red Room by H G Wells, The Signalman by Charles Dickens and The Tell-Tale Heart by Edgar Allen Poe. The three pieces were all performed in full, period costume on a Victorian

set, with ingenious, atmospheric lighting and sound effects. The workshop provided a great introduction to the genre for our students who began studying 'Jane Eyre' following the Christmas break.

The Gothic tradition utilises elements such as supernatural encounters, remote locations, complicated family histories, ancient manor houses, dark secrets, and mysteries to create an atmosphere of suspense and terror.

The plot of Jane Eyre includes most of these elements.

Students all thoroughly enjoyed the workshop and teaching staff have all utilised the sessions (thereafter) to effectively recall elements of the gothic, bringing these alive for our classes.

Holocaust Remembrance Day

At Verulam we are proud to hold the status of a Holocaust Beacon School, Our core values of compassion and inclusion were demonstrated by our Yr 9 pupils on the recent Curriculum **Enrichment Day that focused** on the Holocaust. A number of Verulam Staff are trained as specialist teachers of the Holocaust and with the support of the Social Sciences Department delivered a day of activities that developed our pupils knowledge of this genocide. The day enabled pupils to understand how small acts of intolerance. ignorance, injustice and prejudice can lead to the atrocities associated with this challenging period in human history.

Our pupils in Yr 9 examined themes such as 'Being Human' studying the stories of the victims, the bystanders, the collaborators and the perpetrators. Through looking at pictures of a child's toy the boys learned the story of Barney Greenman, how he survived Auschwitz while his wife and child perished. Pupils are encouraged to develop their understanding how religious intolerance can grow within a historical and current context. We also reflect upon how, for many of those who lived, 'surviving survival' was a lifelong challenge.

In the afternoon we came together as a year group to watch the story of Freddie Knoller a remarkable survivor who demonstrated our core value of strength. His strength of character, his resilience and the strength of the relationships that played a part in his survival was inspiration to our pupils.

It is challenging day for students, Mr Hobbs and the team of teachers who worked with Yr 9 on CE Day felt a deep sense of pride in the compassion, maturity, depth of knowledge and thirst for understanding that was demonstrated again and again through the course of the day.




More competition came in February from the Maths faculty in the shape of the Year 7 Herts for Learning Group Challenge.

History Trip to Berlin

A group of GCSE History Year 11 students embarked on a three day residential trip to Berlin on 1st February 2023, focusing on the Cold War, part of their **Superpower Relations and** Cold War GCSE course. After an early flight, we arrived in Berlin and spent the afternoon at the Bundestag, the German Parliament building. We then had a walking tour of the centre of the city, including the Fuhrer Bunker, Brandenburg Gate and the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe.

On day two, we spent the morning at Sachsenhausen Nazi Concentration Camp, which was interestingly turned into a Soviet camp from 1945-50, re-opening just months after the Red Army liberated the area from Nazi control. After, we ventured to Cecilienhof Palace, the site of the famous Potsdam Conference in 1945 where Churchill (later replaced by Attlee), Roosevelt and Stalin met to discuss plans for

Germany after the war. It was at this conference the exact borders of Germany and Berlin were determined which would shape the rest of the Cold War. That evening after dinner, students enjoyed a few games of bowling before heading back to our hotel.

On the last day, we started with an early morning walking tour of the Berlin Wall on Bernauer Strasse. talking about topics such as the early Cold War crises, the influx of refugees into West Berlin and the impact of the construction of the Wall on US-Soviet relations. not forgetting some of the bizarre methods of escape East Berliners attempted, and sometimes succeeded. Later, we visited Checkpoint Charlie and the museum, the site of the famous standoff between American and Soviet tanks in 1961.

With the disruption of COVID, many Year 11 students have not had the same experience with educational trips; the Year 11 students were ambassadors for

the school and certainly enjoyed their time in Germany, even if they had to wear their personalised orange hoodies 24/7!

Geography A-level Fieldwork

On Friday 17th March the Lower Sixth departed for Lesson House, a fieldwork centre just outside of Swanage on the Isle of Purbeck in Dorset, for 4 days of fieldwork. The purpose of this is twofold. Firstly, the fieldwork report is 20% of their A level grade. Secondly but more important is that Geography is the study of the real world and the many interactions between man and nature, fieldwork allows us to study this in detail and improve our understanding of the world we live in.

To this end, we set out to investigate the village of Corfe Castle and understand the perceptions of community generated within the village. Following this we looked into the coastal management in Swanage Bay itself before moving up to Studland to study the fragile sand dune ecosystems found there.

After these introductions, the students designed their own fieldwork to be carried out. This involved not only setting their own questions and hypothesis but designing the methods to collect the data itself. Following this fieldwork, we are now analysing the results in order to understand what we have found and compare this to the theory and other areas that have also experienced the same circumstances.

Thanks to the students who made such a positive contribution to the work, Mr Hobbs for his expertise and those of you who played along to guess where the photos were taken!

This year 33 Year 10 students volunteered to take on an additional qualification the: Higher Project Qualification. This is an accredited qualification examined by AQA exam board and is the 'younger sibling' to the EPQ (Extended project qualification) that runs in Sixth Form.

As with EPQ, the HPQ is a project-based qualification where students come up with their own research project and learn how to research successfully and then compile a thorough 2,000 word report on their chosen topic. This qualification is separate from any specific curriculum subject and the chosen topics therefore cannot be something the student studies in school – it has to be something they are interested in that is additional to their studies.

Over the course of the year inevitably some students have dropped out of the course – it is quite a commitment requiring students to attend after school for an additional lesson every week and to then work independently on their project. In total, this qualification takes 60 hours of work. As I write this, our final 14 students have completed and

submitted their projects on a wide range of subjects as indicated below:

What makes the ultimate hedgehog house? (Alongside this project, the student constructed the hedgehog box as part of the project)

How do I convey cultural ideas about life in Nigeria alongside global issues around bullying in a short play? (This student also wrote his play as part of the project)

How will you power a car in the future? The impact of automation in the retail industry.

What are the current capabilities of space travel, and where could we go in the near future?

Are serial killers formed by nature or nurture?

Why do academics disagree on the cause and meanings of dreams and what is their impact?

How can we justify the death penalty?

Could the legalisation of cannabis improve mental health?

How did World War Two impact scientific and technological advances?

Can anything be art?

A study of the impacts of social media on teenagers.

The next stage is for these students to present their projects to an audience of staff and parents. This is a formal presentation and takes courage. I wish them all the best with their presentations and look forward to celebrating the amazing work these students have completed this year.

In the Summer term I will be arranging an evening presentation to current Year 9 parents and students to explain more about the HPQ and encourage students to take up the opportunity to complete this qualification when they begin Year 10 in September. This qualification is worth half a GCSE and is finished by Easter of Year 10. In terms of Sixth Form applications, it will give these students a really interesting topic to discuss and clear evidence of their ability to work independently.

Pi day 2023

On 14 March 2023 mathematicians across the world celebrated Pi Day. Pi is the ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter and is approximated to be 3.14, hence the celebrations on this day! Our Mathematics department always look forward to this day and plan lots of fun activities for the students.

Some examples of this year's activities are:

Mrs Cornmell, Ms Moreland and some KS3 mathematicians delivered an assembly all about the history of Pi and the concept of Pi being irrational (the numbers after the decimal places will never end!)

Year 7 made Pi bead chains and Pi Sky lines.



Year 8 enjoyed learning about the history of Pi as a guided reading activity.

Year 9 tried to find patterns in the digits of Pi that have been calculated to date


Partnership with Waterstones

Safeguarding information for parents and carers



Young people continue to be targeted by criminal organisations and this has proved to be more prevalent in towns which surround major cities and those towns which may be considered to be affluent.

We are using our half-termly newsletters to inform parents and carers of safeguarding information we feel will support them in keep their children safe.

'Child exploitation refers to the use of children for someone else's advantage, gratification or profit often resulting in unjust, cruel and harmful treatment of the child.'

Save the Children, 2021

When viewed as exploitation we are clear that the child is the victim and the others involved are the perpetrators, regardless of whether the child or young person thinks that they have actively agreed to do whatever they are being asked to do.

Forms of child exploitation:

Criminal exploitation

Children/young people coerced and/or manipulated to commit crime;

Sexual exploitation

Children/young people coerced/ manipulated into sexual activity. Does not have to be in person, can be over the internet;

County lines

Children/young people being used to distribute drugs for gangs;

Trafficking

Movement of children/young people for purposes of exploitation;

Modern slavery

Children/young people being forced into servitude, slavery or situations where they have to undertake forced or compulsory labour;

Money mules

Children/young people being forced to launder money through their bank accounts.

Sign and indicators

Extra money, clothes, mobile phones etc. without plausible explanation;

Sudden changes in friendship groups;

Increased secretiveness; Exclusion, unexplained absences or returning late without explanation;

Involvement with drugs/alcohol; Relationships with controlling or significantly older individuals or groups;

Internet/social media concerns or excessive receipt of texts/ phone calls;

Self-harm or significant changes in emotional well-being.

Power imbalance

The common theme within all exploitative situations is the imbalance of power - the exploiter holds the power, and the victim has very little control if any.

Control is maintained through threats, access to items the victim wants, and/or continuing a relationship.

Research shows that all children and young people are vulnerable to exploitation, especially those needing support, affection and/or are, or perceive themselves to be, disadvantaged in some way.

Exploiters are adept at changing their methods quickly to avoid detection.


